Some Activities to help promote summer reading for both classes:

1. Visit your local library and have your child pick out books that they would like to read.
2. Have your child create a summer journal. Have them draw pictures of favorite summer activities, write words they know, and keep track of other fun summer activities.

3. Share a summer calendar with you child. Have your child draw pictures or write words of upcoming special events and past events on the day that they occur.
4. Please have your child create their own books. Allow your child to read the book with you after it is completed.
5. Go on a letter/word hunt for letters and words your child knows by building reading observation. Have your child look at cereal boxes, soup cans, or other common items around the house.
6. Send postcards or thank you cards to friends or relatives.
7. Please help your child create and organize a library in his/her bedroom.
8. Please help your child read and act out a story/book.
9. Have your child help you to cook their favorite food item by reading a recipe.
10. Go to a museum with your child and help them read some common words located around the museum. Then, have your child create a book to describe their experience.
11. Go to the zoo with your child and have them record their experiences on paper either by printing words or drawing a picture then retelling it to a family member.
12. Help your child make some Artwork such as collages, bookmarks, or posters, then have your child print some words to describe it and read them to you.
13. Please continue to read rhyming books and alphabet books with your child.
